



## **NSW ELECTIONS – 26 MARCH 2011**

### **POLITICAL PARTIES RESPOND TO THE NSW JEWISH BOARD OF DEPUTIES TEN QUESTIONS OF INTEREST TO THE NSW JEWISH COMMUNITY**

Prior to the announcement of the NSW State Election, the New South Wales Jewish Board of Deputies presented 10 questions to the State Government, the State Opposition, Christian Democratic Party and The Greens, asking them to state their positions in key issues of concern to the Jewish community.

Their responses are tabled on the following pages.

<p>1. The support of the <b>NSW Police</b> for the NSW Jewish community has been exemplary, particularly in protecting High Holyday services and major events. Given that there have been 19 serious attacks on NSW synagogues since the 1991 Gulf War without any arrest being made the NSW Jewish community is keen to see an increase in the resources applied to the investigation, prosecution and deterrence of such crimes. In government, would your party increase the resources to enable the NSW Police to investigate and make arrests in cases of crimes against places of worship? Would your party increase the level of priority given to the investigation of crimes against places of worship?</p>	<p>The Keneally Government has invested a record \$2.8 billion in the NSW Police Force this financial year.</p> <p>The NSW Labor Government has grown the authorized strength of NSW Police Force by more than 22.5% to a record 15,806 officers, over the last 15 years.</p> <p>It's clear that this Government's investment in resources, equipment, technology and police numbers have had a huge impact on crime in NSW. Ten years ago, every major crime category in NSW was stable or rising. Now, every major crime category is stable or falling. Property crime has halved and violent crime continues to fall. Ultimately, that means hundreds of thousands of people who are not the victim of crime.</p> <p>The Keneally Government will continue to support our police by providing them with record numbers, and the best resources and technology available</p> <p>Labor's plans to further increase police resources will be announced before the election on March 26<sup>th</sup>.</p>	<p>The NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals expressed their support for a proactive working relationship between Police and the NSW Jewish community. Such a relationship is an important part of community based policing.</p> <p>We are committed to providing the NSW Police Force with the resources and support to protect our community in order to recognise that criminal attacks on significant community assets, which includes places of worship, must be rigorously investigated.</p> <p>The Shadow Police Minister Hon. Mike Gallacher MLC is agreeable to discussing with the NSW Police Commissioner whether the issuing of a reward for information leading to the arrest of offenders involved in the 19 attacks on NSW synagogues will successfully resolve these crimes. Mr Gallacher hopes this may prompt someone closely associated with one or more of the individuals involved in these crimes to come forward with vital information.</p> <p>The NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals look forward to working with all of your members to the betterment of the entire community.</p>	<p>The Greens are appalled at all crimes against places of worship. We are committed to working with all affected religious communities to ensure that the practice of religion can be conducted free from fear of violence and discrimination. All crimes of violence and intimidation are to be condemned, particularly those that are targeted on the basis of religion or ethnicity. We agree that resources within the existing criminal justice system should be better targeted to the investigation of crimes against places of worship.</p> <p>The Greens believe that such crimes should also be addressed by enhancing the teaching of the values of tolerance and inclusion to all school children.</p>	<p>We fully support the increase of the level of priority to protect Jewish places of worship.</p>

There is broad consensus among experts that current provisions for criminal prosecution under the <b>Anti-Discrimination Act (NSW)</b> preclude any prosecution being launched.</p> <p>In government, would your party support the amendment to the Crimes Act that has been proposed by the Anti-Discrimination Board that would make it a criminal offence to publicly and recklessly incite hatred towards, or harass, another person or group of people because of the actual or presumed race, colour, cultural heritage or national, ethnic or ethno-religious origin, homosexuality, HIV/AIDS infection or transgender identity?</p> <p>Would your government commit resources to programs designed to achieve deterrence of such attacks?</p>	<p>Labor will strengthen anti-vilification measures by introducing a new aggravated offence of racist and obscene graffiti. This will mean heavier penalties for antisemitic graffiti, such as swastikas and other inappropriate symbols which will be prosecuted not just as ordinary graffiti but as an aggravated offence recognising its greater severity.</p> <p>Racist, offensive or obscene graffiti is simply wrong and has no place in our society.</p> <p>Daubing a synagogue with a Nazi symbol goes beyond mere graffiti and is a racist attack. It should be treated as such.</p> <p>Labor supports the criminalisation of racial vilification under existing state law. The <i>NSW Anti-Discrimination Act 1977</i> prohibits racial vilification in this State. Under the Act, 'it is unlawful for a person, by a public act, to incite hatred towards, serious contempt for, or severe ridicule of, a person or group of persons on the ground of the race of the person or members of the group'. 'Race' is defined broadly to include colour, nationality, descent and ethnic, ethno-religious or national origin.</p> <p>NSW law also makes serious racial vilification a criminal offence. Serious vilification involves not only inciting hatred, serious contempt or severe ridicule of a person or group on the ground of their race, but also threatening physical harm, or inciting others to threaten physical harm.</p>	<p>In the last NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals Government from 1988 to 1995, we strengthened the <i>Anti-Discrimination Act</i> by introducing anti-vilification laws to prevent the incitement of hatred within the community. In 1994 the Act was amended so that, in the words of the then Attorney General, Hon. John Hannaford MLC, "<i>Ethno-religious groups such as Jews, Muslims and Sikhs, have access to the racial discrimination and vilification provisions of the Act</i>". A NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals Government will examine possible options to strengthen penalties and provisions relating to groups and/or individuals who incite violence.</p>	<p>Legal sanctions against vilification and incitement of hatred against various religious and other groups are an important component in protecting the civil and human rights of all individuals and communities. They are also an important codification of a key ingredient of a civilised society. Where they are not working, there is a clear need to remedy the failure, and to ensure that there exist viable mechanisms to secure convictions of people guilty of such crimes. The Greens are committed to working with all affected groups to ensure that the law is reformed. This includes amendments to the Crimes Act as proposed by the Antidiscrimination Board (ADB) and suitably strengthened penalties for conduct that is aggravated by proven prejudice.</p>	<p>We oppose all attempts to incite hatred but are concerned that the Muslims may use this power to attack Jews and Christians.</p>
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	<p>The maximum penalty for an individual is six months imprisonment, a fine of \$5500, or both. The maximum penalty for a corporation is \$11,000.</p> <p>The Government also funds measures to deter racist attacks by promoting multiculturalism in NSW through the work of the Anti-Discrimination Board and the Community Relations Commissions, which provides \$1.6 million in funding through the Community Development Grants Program.</p>			
<p><b>3. Counter-terrorism</b> is an area of federal-state partnership. What specific resources would your party in government allocate to strengthening counter-terrorism capability and emergency management resources in NSW?</p>	<p>The NSW Police Force Counter-Terrorism Command was created in 2002 in the wake of the Bali bombings for the investigation and prevention of terrorist attacks. This command is also tasked with responding to high risk incidents, providing specialist dog and armoury services, undertaking bomb disposal operations, investigating and collecting intelligence on terrorist suspects and incidents, protection of critical infrastructure and the co-ordination of security operations for dignitaries and high risk visitors to NSW.</p> <p>This highly specialised and well equipped Command has a staff of over 600.</p> <p>The command is in addition to the work of other police units that continue to support the counter-terrorism effort, including the Public Order and Riot Squad which has 100 officers and the regional State Protection Support Units, which have over 200 officers.</p>	<p>The NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals are committed to the NSW Police Force and the NSW Crime Commission working with the Australian Federal Police (AFP) and Australian Security Intelligence Organisation (ASIO) in order to strengthen counterterrorism capability and emergency management resources in NSW. The NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals support the autonomy of the NSW Police Force in their current arrangements of the Counter Terrorism &amp; Special Tactics Command, and specifically the Anti Terrorism &amp; Security Group investigating all threats (or acts) of terrorism impacting NSW.</p>	<p>The Greens believe that all members of society and all communities and groups should feel safe and protected. We will work towards a society where fear of persecution or random attack is minimised. <p><b>4. Under the proposed federal education syllabus overhaul, signposts towards teaching of the Holocaust and genocide have been included. In the experience of educators in the NSW Jewish community, the number of students with basic understanding of how racial hatred can lead to genocide (the Holocaust being a key example) is diminishing. In government, would your party support a substantive unit of study addressing racial hatred and genocide in the core high school curriculum?</b></p>	<p>The NSW Government has successfully argued for study of the Holocaust to be included as a compulsory part of the new national history curriculum. That means that the new history curriculum in NSW will include an examination of significant events of World War II, including the Holocaust.</p> <p>Until the new curriculum is in place, students will continue to have the opportunity to learn about the Holocaust under the existing NSW syllabus.</p> <p>The Holocaust can currently be covered in several ways as part of either the mandatory or elective Years 7-10 History courses. There are also opportunities to study the Holocaust in the Higher School Certificate Modern History Course and the History extension course.</p> <p>The Sydney Jewish Museum currently lists eight different NSW secondary syllabuses in which the Holocaust can be</p>	<p>The NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals support the development of students' understanding of the Holocaust and genocide. <p>5. Would your party in government allocate increased resources to education programs in public schools promoting <b>interfaith dialogue and community harmony</b>? What methodologies would you undertake to ensure that more action is taken against racism and antisemitism in NSW schools?</p>	<p>NSW public schools are inclusive places and we currently have a number of programs aimed at strengthening this culture. The Education Department's Cultural Diversity and Community Relations Policy: Multicultural Education in Schools and Anti-Racism Policy provide the framework for programs that promote interfaith education and cross cultural understanding.</p> <p>The NSW Government already promotes religious diversity in our schools and supports a number of programs to achieve this. This includes <i>Courage to Care</i> - a travelling exhibition developed by the B'nai B'rith Jewish Service organisation and endorsed by the Department for student involvement. <i>Courage to Care</i> emphasises the importance of tolerance and understanding of minority groups in a multicultural society. The exhibition focuses on how caring for fellow human beings sometimes takes courage. It tells the story of people whose actions saved persecuted Jews during the Holocaust. Through these stories the exhibition demonstrates the universal message of the power of the individual to make a difference to the lives of others. Students hear stories from Holocaust survivors who owe their lives to the actions of others. In 2010/11 the Government increased funding for the Community Relations Commission by 4% to \$18.6 million, and is providing \$4.4m to the Anti-Discrimination Board.</p> <p>Only recently, the NSW Government elevated the status of the Commission to a division of Government under the Department of Justice &amp; Attorney General, so that the Commission reports directly to the Premier, as well as the Minister. As an ageing community, the Jewish community has a particular interest in services for older people such as home care services and community health.</b></p> <p>What would your party in government do to increase and improve the services presently available?</p> <p>And what plans would you put in place to ensure that adequate and accessible land is set aside for cemeteries?</p>	<p>The NSW Government is responsible for Home and Community Care (HACC) funding which supports older people to remain living in their homes as long as possible and to avoid premature entry to aged care facilities.</p> <p>The Keneally Government (with the Commonwealth) injected around \$650 million in the last financial year, up from \$443 million in 2005/06. This included the delivery of 12 dementia day care centers all over NSW.</p> <p>The Keneally Government maintains its commitment to our ageing strategy – <i>Towards 2030</i>.</p> <p>Towards 2030: Planning for our changing population (Towards 2030) is a comprehensive, whole-of-government approach to ensure that we are positioned to meet the opportunities and challenges of an ageing population. Many transactions in daily life require some form of photo identification (ID). People without photo ID can face stress and humiliations, extra costs, and sometimes miss out on entitlements. Given the importance of <b>early-childhood education</b> for children in low-income families, does your party propose to increase the availability of, and improve access to, early childhood education?</p>	<p>The Keneally Government is committed to early childhood development as a cornerstone for a bright future for the next generations. This has been demonstrated by the Government’s biggest investment in 30 years through the <i>Preschool Investment and Reform Program</i>, with an 85% boost in funding to NSW community preschools in 2009/10 under the National Partnership.</p> <p>Additional funding for disadvantaged children already means that Aboriginal children pay less than half the average daily preschool fee, and children from low-income families just slightly more than half the average. As a result, their preschool participation rates have significantly increased in 2009.</p> <p>Research shows that high quality early childhood care can improve child development and school performance, especially for children who are disadvantaged. This is why the Keneally Government delivered the 1:4 staff-to-child ratio to improve care for babies in childcare ahead of the National Quality Framework requirements.</p> <p>Labor’s plans to further target early childhood development will be announced before the election on March 26<sup>th</sup>.</p>	<p>The NSW Liberals &amp; Nationals agree that early childhood education is important, and that’s why we have announced a \$250 million <i>Literacy and Numeracy Action Plan</i>.</p> <p>Early childhood is a critical period in a child’s learning and development. A number of Australian states have <b>bilateral agreements with Israel</b> in areas such as science, technology (including water management) and trade.</p> <p>Would your party in government consider implementing a bilateral trade relationship with Israel?</p>	<p>Labor strongly supports a bilateral agreement with Israel of the type outlined, Industry and Investment NSW has been in discussions with the Israeli Chamber regarding a Memorandum of Understanding for Research and Development technology over the last 12 months. Both the Minister for State Development and the Minister for Science and Medical Research have met directly with the chamber.
